## New Security Products

I recently had the opportunity to attend the annual meeting and convention of the Association of Personal Computer User Groups (APCUG) in Las Vegas. Even though I have attended APCUG

annual events since 1991, it always amazes me how quickly technology changes, and how those changes are rapidly

introduced to us consumers. Every year participants are astounded by what we see, but every year has also demonstrated technologies dwarfing those shown the previous year. The APCUG events were all on topics related to personal computers, including security, applications, operating systems, hardware, CPU, and other technological services and components. Three of the presenters were companies in the computer security software sector.

Grisoft (www.grisoft.com) is a computer security software publisher headquartered in the Czech Republic, and best known in the U.S. for its very popular free version of AVG antivirus software. I was very surprised to learn that the more sophisticated and comprehensive commercial versions of AVG are among the most widely used computer security utilities in Europe. AVG has a professional staff of engineers in Europe, but also has sales, and more importantly technical support services, located in the U.S. I have to admit that until I saw the AVG-Grisoft presentation, I was unaware of the degree of sophistication and quality features built in and backing up the AVG products. My opinion of AVG was positively changed, as I had always thought of it as an excellent



free anti-virus product; now I know it as a technological leader providing enhanced features and functionality in its products. While I will still recommend the free version of AVG antivirus software to those who may not be able to afford commercial software, I would also hope that those who use AVG free version and are satisfied with it would eventually upgrade to the more comprehensive and feature rich commercial products.

### Using the Temporary Internet Files Folder to Capture Songs

On most music sites you can download a song by right-clicking its name and choosing **Save Target As** (using Internet Explorer — users of Firefox or Netscape click **Save Link As**.)

This normally saves a copy of the selection in your *My Music* folder, which is inside your *My Documents* folder. Before clicking **Save** or **OK**, you can accept the song's default name or type in any name you might prefer, as long as you leave the name's three-letter extension unchanged (such as WAV or WMA, etc.).

Not all websites allow you to download songs using the steps described above — some are rigged to keep you from right-clicking on anything.

Nonetheless, if left-clicking a song causes it to play in Windows Media Player 10, you can use **File>Save As** to copy the song onto your hard drive. If you are using Windows Media Player 11, you need to right-click the Title Bar to display the **File** menu. Then you can use **File>Save As** to download the song.

Some sites are rigged so that clicking a selection will let you listen to the song, but will not show it playing via a media player. Well, this problem can usually be overcome by retrieving the song from your *Temporary Internet Files* folder.

#### What is a *Temporary Internet Files* Folder?

Whenever you visit a website, many of the items you click on — such as images or music files — are copied onto your hard drive into a folder named *Temporary Internet Files*. The reason is that having these items on your hard drive makes them display faster if you decide to re-access a previously visited page.

Well, most music files you access are copied into this folder, whereupon you can retrieve them by opening the folder and dragging them onto your Desktop. Here's how it's done:

First you have to find the folder that contains the target songs. Windows XP usually has multiple folders

named *Temporary Internet Files*. Go to **Start>Search>All Files & Folders** and type **Temporary Internet Files** into the *All or Part of File Name* box. Also, click *More Advanced Options* and be sure that *Search System Folders*, *Search Hidden Files & Folders*, and *Search Subfolders* have checkmarks. Now click the **Search** button.

Next, double-click each of the yellow folders that appear in order to display its contents. When you find the folder that has your target songs, simply drag them onto your Desktop (or into any folder you may have created for them). Finally, double-click any song to play it via Windows Media Player (or whichever media player you might be currently using — I recommend Windows Media Player 11).

#### Convert All Caps to Upper & Lower Case in MSWord

Donna Walters called to say she received an MSWord document which had been typed in ALL CAPITAL LETTERS, and asked if there was an easy way to convert it to traditional upper and lower case sentence structure. Yes; by selecting the target text and pressing **F3** while holding down CTRL, all the caps will change to lower case. Press **F3** again and the first letter of each sentence will be capitalized. Another **F3** will return everything to all caps. However, other capitalization - such as names, places, and titles - will still need to be edited separately.

By the way, *basic email courtesy* tells us to **NEVER SEND MESSAGES IN ALL CAPITAL LETTERS**. All caps are fine for headlines or other key phrases, but are just plain harder to read when used throughout a lengthy letter. Furthermore, ALL CAPITAL LETTERS give recipients the feeling they are being yelled at. Any all cap emails Mary or I receive always go to the bottom of the list.

AVG offers a comprehensive selection of security software ranging from antivirus software to complete security suites. AVG has been certified as among the most effective antivirus products by several independent testing and rating services.



Panda Software ([www.pandasoftware.com](http://www.pandasoftware.com)) is a publisher of computer security software headquartered in Spain, but with a strong American presence. I first became acquainted with Panda several years ago when I purchased a copy of Panda Antivirus at one of the big-box office supply stores. I had read some amazing reviews of it in a computer magazine, so I decided to try it on my Windows 98 computer to replace an expired competing big-named American product. My "98" computer continued to have Panda protect it for the remainder of its lifetime, and Panda never failed me. At APCUG Panda amazed me with its degree of technical sophistication in dealing with the changing threats facing the computing public. According to Panda, over 90,000 new malware threats appeared in 2006, with some individual months in 2006 having as many new threats as in all of 2005. Panda explained how the threat scenario for computer users changed from the old-fashioned viruses intended to damage computer files with random acts of vandalism, to the new threats that are almost all commercially driven. Panda Software offers technology security solutions ranging from its free online "Active Scan", to free-standing antivirus software, to comprehensive security suites complete with antivirus, firewall, anti-spyware, anti-spam, wi-fi protection, and other protective features. Panda has its own proprietary "TruPrevent Technologies" which is designed to protect computers from attack by new and unknown viruses even before the virus signatures can be updated. Most Panda Software packages can be installed on multiple computers under a single license, and should be considered as a very strong and capable competitor to other better known security products on the market.



Trend Micro ([www.trendmicro.com](http://www.trendmicro.com)) explained the degree and types of security threats facing computer users. Identity theft of various types was discussed as well as the means to detect, protect, and neutralize a wide variety of other computer threats. Threats can come via email, malicious code on websites, from file

sharing services, and countless other places. In order to deal with and protect from a wide variety of threats, Trend Micro demonstrated its flagship product Trend Micro Internet Security 2007 with its integral TrendSecure online services. Previously known under the moniker PC-Cillin, Trend Micro Internet Security 2007 provides protection from viruses, spyware, spam, phishing, and other forms of attack. Features also include a "fraud defense" to explicitly help protect credit card and other sensitive personal information from being compromised while online. The 2007 version includes a single license that can be installed on three computers which make it both a qualitative and economical good choice when compared to the other name brand security software titles widely available at retail.

I am a firm believer in good competition and the free enterprise system. As was clearly demonstrated at APCUG and CES, competition drives innovation which in turn provides valuable and tangible benefits to the consumer. We all need antivirus and other flavors of security software on our computers and any of the feisty competitors above can provide a quality product and service at very competitive prices. If more computer users could have seen what those of us at the APCUG event saw, the security "biggies" would have a lot to fear, because these aggressive "little guys" are providing excellence by innovation and superior service and support at a fair price. Those big guys on the block should be looking over their shoulders, as these little guys are growing stronger by capitalizing on the weaknesses of their larger competitors. Security software should not just be purchased based on the familiarity of the name or brand, but on the quality of the services and support offered. Any of the three products mentioned above would be a good choice for virtually all PC users.

## Pandora—a Free Music Resource

The Internet is filled with free resources, but some are better than others. Here is one of the best free music resources on the Web.

Pandora is one of my favorite music websites. Just surf over to [www.pandora.com](http://www.pandora.com) and type in a song or an artist that you like. Pandora analyses your choice and creates a music station with similar-sounding music. It will then play comparable songs that it thinks you will like. You can add more music and/or artists to the station to refine your choices. You can also tell Pandora whether or not you like the song that is playing. It uses your likes and dislikes to refine the songs it chooses. You can create up to 100 different stations with different types of music.

Pandora was created by the Music Genome Project, a group of musicians and music-loving technologists who have broken music into hundreds of music attributes or “genes” such as melody, harmony, rhythm, instrumentation, orchestration, arrangement, lyrics, and harmony. They then use high-tech methodology to analyze the musical qualities of each song and rendition.

The results are uncanny. I created several music stations with different genres that I like and in almost every case I was presented with similar music that I found very pleasing. You can experiment with different combinations. For instance, putting James Taylor and Willie Nelson together gave me an interesting, but likable mix of music.

Pandora is pretty smart. Typing in The Christmas Song and choosing Diana Krall as the artist gave me a whole station of mellow Christmas music which is just what I was looking for. Typing in The Nylons and Take 6 gave me a nice selection of acappella and harmonic music.

Pandora also lets you bookmark songs or artists so you can remember what you liked. You can look up more information about artists and songs right on the site. Two clicks will lead you to iTunes or Amazon where you can purchase the music. You can also share your music by emailing your stations to friends.

Pandora is ad-supported so you will see ads for everything from gym shoes to cell service. I found the ads to be unobtrusive, but if you want to get rid of them, you can pay to eliminate them. For \$36, you get 12 months of unlimited use with services exactly the same as the free version, but without the ads.

Since the ads don't bother me, I'll continue to use the free version of Pandora. It's an entertaining website that provides much listening pleasure to keep me company when I am working on the computer.

If you are into music, you may also want to check out two other music resources. MusicIP Mixer and Goombah. Like Pandora, both of these sites provide intriguing music adventures.

## User Group Weblog & Trackbacks

Several User Groups are now offering Weblogs (aka Blogs) in addition to their regular Web sites. Blogging is a great way to convey new information to members and the public at large.

Depending on how the blog administrator has set it up, members who have registered may post to the blog. Generally the administrator will be notified of a new post that needs moderation/approval. Likewise members may wish to comment on a particular posting.

This has led to the question of sharing related information between User Group Blogs. This question arose recently when I had information on Windows Vista I wished to share on the APCUG Blog. Not having permission to post, I contacted Don Singleton and he suggested using “trackback”. Being new to blogging and having only recently set up the SWIPCC Blog, I did not have any idea what Don was referring to. Undaunted, I delved into the subject and this report is the sum of what I have learned.

The information to be detailed here deals specifically with the Wordpress Blogging package available free at <http://wordpress.org>.

The principals and procedures should apply to all Blogging packages which have the track back feature.

**Pandora—from page 7****YouTube Revolutionizes the Internet!**

Just when I thought creative ideas were running out for ways to use the Internet, along comes YouTube, [www.youtube.com](http://www.youtube.com). Its content includes movie and TV clips, music videos, and amateur works — such as video-blogging. The innovative site's popularity is staggering. Almost 20 million visitors browse YouTube each month, according to Nielsen/NetRatings. And, in confirmation of YouTube's originality, Time magazine named it the "Invention of the Year" in 2006.

Although I only discovered YouTube in December 2006, it was founded in February 2005. In about a year and a half, YouTube has been so successful Google sealed the deal to buy it in November 2006 for \$1.65-billion! Not bad for a site that was launched with a video of a co-founder's cat playing with a dangling string!

Now, "Users upload 6500 new videos to the site every day," according to a January 2007 Time magazine article. Many of the videos are taken with home camcorders and cell phones. In fact, videos that showed L.A. police repeatedly punching a suspect on the ground, a college student being tasered, and an outraged comedian yelling disparaging ethnic descriptions, were shown on television news after first being uploaded to YouTube. These homemade videos, which were a sensation on the news, initially prompted me to check out the site.

Incredibly, YouTube viewers watch 100 million videos each day — up from 10 million last year. The most-watched clip, with over 36+ million views is a compilation of head-butt animations inspired by the one Zinedine Zidane administered in the 2006 World Cup soccer game.

YouTube is free. You only need to sign up if you want to leave comments about the videos, rate them, or upload your own.

Choose videos from categories like Recent Videos below, which include viewer ratings, video length, and description

First – what is a trackback?

Trackbacks – also known as pingbacks is a method of having two different Weblog articles linked together. Let's say I write an article on the latest and greatest gadget and want to link to a similar article on a different Weblog. First I need to find out the trackback URL of the Weblog post I wish to link to. If the Weblog is using Wordpress, open the post comments and just above "Leave a Reply," you will see trackback which is hyperlinked. Right click and copy the link. Return to your Weblog and enter your post as normal, scroll down the page and locate "Send trackbacks to:" and paste the URL in the space provided. Save and publish your post and in a few moments an excerpt and Linkback URL should appear in the comments of the article you wish to link to. Well maybe it will.

Things to be aware of:

Do not enter trackback more than once and do not enter the URL of the Weblog site. Doing so will risk confusing the trackback script and result in no valid trackbacks being sent. The trackback URL can have several forms:

The last two use .htaccess rewrite rules which is beyond the scope of this article.

If you have the Askimet Spam blocker plug-in activated it will block the trackback from being sent to moderation. The administrator will have to monitor Askimet Spam and determine if the trackback is legitimate and whether to accept it. Once approved, the trackback will be posted and no further moderation is necessary.

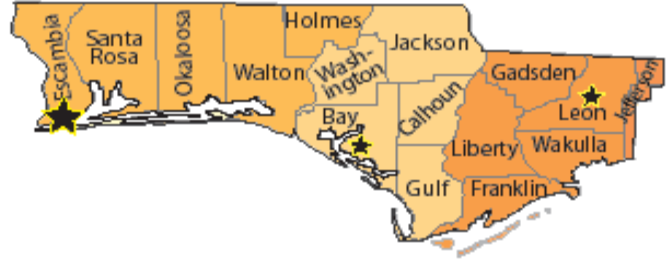
